Dear fellow PAAA members and friends,

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
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## A CHOPIN EVENT: Meeting with Author Annik LaFarge

In celebrating our annual PAAA Wigilia online this year, using prerecorded messages and live presentations, we tried to keep as close as possible to the format that became the standard for our in person gatherings. So first, our duszpasterz Father Philip Majka talked about and virtually blessed the oplatek for all to share. Then Celia Larkin, Stefan Lopatkiewicz, Mary Ann Evan and Marianna Eckel described the early PAAA Wigilias, starting with 1979 up to 1990 when we were invited to celebrate the tradition at the Embassy of the newly liberated Poland. This was followed by greetings from Polish Ambassador Piotr Wilczek who extended the wishes to all of the Polish community and we, in turn, wished the people of Poland happiness in the New Year. Greetings were also extended by Henry Sienkiewicz, president of the Arts Club of Washington where the PAAA holds Wigilia each December since 2014.

After the ACPC President Raymond Glembocki shared some of his family's traditions, his wife Cecilia talked about the traditional Wigilia food she prepared and beautifully displayed among the many Polish Christmas decorations in their home. Rose Kobylinski relayed the story of the Krakowska szopka and displayed pawie oczka and other ornaments her mother, Róża Nowotarska, always made at Christmastime. Among other greetings, we heard from Father Cyprian Czop and his parishioner in Minneapolis, Minnesota, our scholarship winners, Nicole Rybak who was on a visit in Poland, and Olivia Dul speaking against the backdrop of holiday lights.

In keeping with the PAAA tradition, the Wigilia program was culminated by Stasia and Olek Skrypczuk leading the *kolędy* singing and many joined in at home, following the text of the songs on the screen.

We wish to thank Dominik Mikolajczyk for coordinating the technical side of the program and on site video recordings. Renata Greenspan made sure that all who wished to participate had no problem with the Zoom online admittance.

It was truly a memorable evening and the good thing is that the memory was preserved and can be viewed on the PAAA YouTube. Come next December, though, we hope that it will be possible to see you all in person for Wigilia 2021.


### Literary Corner by Danuta E. Kosk-Kosicka



Polish-born poet Danuta E. Kosk-Kosicka is the author, translator, and editor of several books of poems in English and Polish, including the recent *Szklana góra/Glass Mountain* which features Lidia Kosk's poem in 22 languages and *Meadows of Memory: Poems and prose by Lidia Kosk*. Her book *Oblige the Light* won the fifth national Clarinda Harriss Poetry Prize. She has translated poems by Polish, as well as American, Catalan, and German poets. Danuta is co-editor of the literary journal *Loch Raven Review*. She holds a Ph.D. in biochemistry; her scientific career

#### Being interviewed for the Library of Congress in the time of the Covid-19 Pandemic



In a heart-warming recognition of my work as a poet, translator and literary journal's editor, who bridges languages and cultures, I was selected to be interviewed for The Library of Congress "The Poet and the Poem 2020-21 Series." The interview, conducted by the Tenth Poet Laureate of Maryland, Grace Cavalieri, was to take place at the Library of Congress recording studio on March 17, 2020. A dream come true, except due to the growing threat of the Pandemic the Library was suddenly off limits, and the interview had to be conducted by phone. Actually, by two phones: the Q&A over the stationary phone, and my readings to be recorded on the cell phone. With the spare hand I needed to hold my book, turn the pages, and keep calm when the sound was disappearing. I was answering the questions, I was reading my poems and my translations. While technically difficult, it was a great honor and pleasure, and an unforgettable experience.

As the first poem I read "Lilac Lilacs," from my book *Face Half-Illuminated*. In it, I allude to the poem "Żal" ("Regret") by Antoni Słonimski. My Polish version, titled "Liliowy bez," won the 2011 "Srebrne Pióro" poetry competition in Poland in the "Polonia" category and was recognized with the The Senate Eagle of the Republic of Poland.

#### Lilac Lilacs

A big branch of lilac. Lilac. Like the ones along the village road. The carriage wheels through the sand, yellow splashes of warblers whir through the fragrance. Lilac smells like ...lilac-May in Poland, warm days, evenings not willing to sleep, simmering desires. And then the verses sound, better than any before. I can't open my eyes to write them down. So I repeat them over and over and slip into another dream. I am gliding through the air of music toward luminous mountains. I see myself as Chagall's figure, long hair floating parallel to my long dress. An orchestra plays Elgar's "In the South" and for the whole time I am there, and the mountains, and the light. Then a phone rings and I wake up to answer, but the phone does not ring. The birds sing into my room. I come down and can't find that poem. But the lilacs. the lilac lilacs...

Widzę siebie jak namalowaną przez Chagalla: długie włosy płyną za suknią. Orkiestra gra "Na południu" Elgara, ja przez cały utwór szybuję w tym samym miejscu ku górom i światłu. Nagle dzwoni telefon, wiec budze sie aby podnieść słuchawkę, lecz telefon milczy. Śpiew ptaków wpływa do pokoju. Przytomnieję i nie pamiętam już tamtego wiersza. Ale bez, liliowy bez...
